

The Siege of a Friendship

A stunning floor-cross gave Mark Carney a majority overnight, minutes before Washington signed a 35% tariff into force. It pulled a shaken country off the knife-edge and into one of the most aggressive acts of economic self-defence in modern Canadian memory.

Below the trade-war headlines, a double shooting in Montreal and a tech rout on Wall Street added their own thunder to a Tuesday that felt untethered from any old playbook. This is the psychogram of a continent in mid-spasm.

When a neighbour stops being the porch light, Canada picks up the shield

Canadians woke on Tuesday to a country that had telescoped an entire political era into 48 hours: an eleventh-hour parliamentary majority, the most punishing cross-border tariff in living memory, and a rare federal–provincial promise to treat an American president’s signature as an act of economic war.

The shock was not that Donald Trump raised the levy — he had been telegraphing it for months under emergency powers linked to fentanyl and migration. The shock was the number: 35%, up from the 25% that had already hollowed out factory schedules and frayed family budgets.

Prime Minister Mark Carney answered from a newly secure foothold after an opposition MP crossed the floor on Monday evening, handing the Liberals a working majority hours before the midnight tariff deadline and turning a precarious minority into a platform for retaliation.

Fifty-eight per cent of Canadians now say the United States is not a reliable ally, yet 80% of Americans still hold a favourable view of Canada. That gap is the emotional architecture of the crisis — a one-sided divorce in which one party has not yet noticed the paperwork.

ON GALLUP POLLING — JULY 2026

The crisis has human faces beyond cabinet rooms: on Monday a gunman in military-style clothing shot dead a Montreal police officer and a civilian in the Côte-des-Neiges neighbourhood before dying himself, breaking through the trade-war coverage with a different kind of grief.

On Wall Street Tuesday began with a steep fall in technology shares that traders called an “AI wake-up call,” spreading unease through portfolios just as families in Ontario and Alberta were recalculating what an extra ten percentage points of tariffs would mean at the checkout and on the shop floor.

The Day At A Glance

A continent ricocheted between three shocks on Tuesday — a freshly minted Canadian majority, a leap in American tariffs, and a fatal shooting in Montreal — while markets tried to price friendship as collateral damage.

Canada — Tariff blow lands

President Trump signed an executive order raising tariffs on Canadian goods that do not meet USMCA terms to 35%, effective immediately. Prime Minister Carney called the move an assault on workers and promised a calibrated retaliation.

Canada — Majority by floor-crossing

A single opposition MP crossed the floor on Monday evening, handing Mark Carney's Liberals a parliamentary majority. The timing, hours before the tariff order, vastly expands the government's legislative room to respond.

Canada — Montreal shooting

A gunman in military-style clothing killed a police officer and a civilian in the Côte-des-Neiges district on Monday before dying himself. The triple fatality is among the deadliest urban security incidents in the country this year.

USA — Tech sell-off spreads

Wall Street technology shares fell sharply in a rout analysts linked to AI valuations. The drop fed a broader bout of volatility already fuelled by trade-war uncertainty.

Canada — Premiers close ranks

Every provincial premier issued a joint statement pledging to defend workers and businesses against the new U.S. levies. The unified message is rare in recent federal-provincial history and underscores the depth of the perceived threat.

Canada — Public trust in the U.S. crumbles

A Gallup poll shows 58% of Canadians no longer view the United States as a reliable ally, while 80% of Americans retain warm feelings toward Canada. The asymmetry is shaping everything from buying habits to vacation plans.

Canada — Alberta separatism stirs

Alberta separatist groups say Carney's new majority gives fresh momentum to their independence referendum campaign. Past meetings between Trump officials and the Alberta Prosperity Project have deepened the province's sense of separate interests.

USA — Religious-rights ruling

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled a Rastafarian inmate cannot sue after being forcibly shaved bald. The decision weighed religious freedom against prison security and highlighted persistent cultural friction points in American life.

Backdrop — A trade war with a history

Trump imposed 25% tariffs on most Canadian imports (10% on energy) in 2025 under IEEPA. Canada retaliated on \$42 billion of U.S. goods, and Carney scrapped the consumer carbon tax to broaden his coalition before the latest escalation.

A friendship unravelling by tariff: Canada steels itself while America looks inward

The oldest trading partnership in the world is in open rupture. As President Trump raised tariffs on Canadian goods to 35 percent on Tuesday, a mood of defiant anxiety swept across Canada, where public trust in the United States has collapsed to an historic low.

Part 1 - The shock of betrayal

Canadians woke on Tuesday to a new economic reality: an executive order signed by President Trump had raised the effective tariff on most of their exports to 35 percent, up from 25 percent, using emergency powers citing fentanyl and immigration. Prime Minister Mark Carney called it an unjustified attack on workers, and by evening the premiers of every province had issued a rare joint pledge to fight back together.

A Gallup poll released this week found 58 percent of Canadians no longer see the U.S. as a reliable ally — a steep fall for a neighbour once considered family — while 80 percent of Americans still say they hold favourable views of Canada, an asymmetry many Canadians read as indifference from a partner that no longer listens.

We will defend our workers and our businesses, together – every premier, every province.

Part 2 - A leader and a country find their footing

If there is a moment of ballast for an anxious country, it arrived on Monday when an opposition member crossed the floor and handed Prime Minister Carney a working parliamentary majority. The timing could not have been more acute: a stable government can now pass its tariff response unencumbered, pushing ahead with a “Buy Canadian” procurement policy and a deliberate pivot toward European trade.

Part 3 - The American mood: volatile and unclear

A sharp tech-stock fall, described as an AI wake-up call, sent major indices sliding and stoked fears of broader market strain south of the border, layered onto a week in which a Supreme Court ruling on inmate religious rights — a Rastafarian forcibly shaved by prison officials — framed a nation still contending over its cultural soul.

Yet the World Cup, co-hosted with Mexico, continues to fill stadiums, and the American public’s affection for Canada endures in polling even if Washington’s policy does not reciprocate. For now, the region feels caught between a desire to compete and a longing to reconcile.

The U.S.-Canada relationship has entered a raw, emotionally charged phase unlike anything in living memory, with a sudden tariff escalation meeting an equally sudden Canadian political consolidation. Beneath the trade headlines, a tech rout, a fatal shooting, and a quiet Supreme Court ruling all pull the region's mood in different directions.

Six People Shaping The News

From the Prime Minister who just secured his majority to the premiers who closed ranks, these are the figures driving the emotional and political arc of the U.S.-Canada region right now.

Mark Carney

Prime Minister of Canada

Carney moved from a precarious minority to a working majority after an opposition member crossed the floor on Monday, giving him the political runway to accelerate his Buy Canadian procurement policy and a broader pivot toward European trade ties. His midnight statement condemning Trump's 35% tariffs struck a tone of steely resolve rather than panic, matching a public mood that is more defiant than frightened.

Donald Trump

President of the United States

Trump signed the executive order raising tariffs on Canadian goods to 35% under IEEPA powers, framing the move around fentanyl and immigration rather than economic competition. The escalation landed on the same day as a tech stock rout, adding a layer of policy-driven uncertainty to an already jittery American market.

Canadian provincial premiers

Collective leadership of provinces

In a display of unity rarely seen in Canadian federal politics, the premiers issued a joint statement pledging to defend workers and businesses against the U.S. tariff escalation. The coordinated message crosses party lines and provincial rivalries, reflecting a shared recognition that the economic threat from Washington is existential enough to override normal political divisions.

Alberta Prosperity Project

Alberta separatist organisation

The group has seized on Carney's majority as proof that Alberta's interests are permanently sidelined within Confederation, citing past meetings with Trump officials as evidence that an independent Alberta could negotiate directly with Washington. Their renewed referendum push is the most serious separatist challenge Canada has faced in decades.

Montreal police

Law enforcement

Officers responded to a fatal shooting in Côte-des-Neiges that left one of their own dead alongside a civilian and the gunman, who was wearing military-style clothing. The incident is the kind of urban trauma that cuts through the noise of trade wars and politics, grounding the national conversation in grief and public safety.

Rastafarian inmate (unnamed)

Litigant before U.S. Supreme Court

The Court ruled that the inmate could not sue over being forcibly shaved bald, drawing a line between religious freedom claims and institutional security needs. The decision is a quiet but pointed reminder that America's culture wars continue to play out in legal arenas even as trade and market dramas dominate the headlines.

The Day, Country By Country

Canada woke up to a new trade war threshold and a new political reality, while the United States absorbed a tech rout and a cultural-legal ruling. The emotional gap between the two neighbours has rarely been wider.

CANADA

Mood: Defiant unity under economic siege

The 35% tariff announcement landed like a thunderclap, but the dominant public emotion is not despair — it is a bristling, wounded resolve. A new Gallup poll showing 58% of Canadians no longer trust the U.S. as an ally captures a psychological break that has been building since the first round of tariffs in 2025, and Carney's midnight statement fed directly into that mood. Economy: Resilience meets a new shock

Canada's GDP grew 2.6% annualised in the fourth quarter of 2025, with the third quarter revised upward to 2.2%, showing an economy that had been absorbing steel and aluminium tariffs without buckling. Mood: Volatile and inward-looking

Sector Watch - Four Things to Track

CANADIAN FINANCIALS AND TECHNOLOGY

Canada's main stock index hit a near six-week high on Monday driven by these very sectors, suggesting that domestic investors are pricing in a degree of resilience despite the tariff shock. The coming weeks will test whether that optimism holds as the 35% rate bites into cross-border supply chains and corporate earnings.

CROSS-BORDER AUTOMOTIVE

The 25% auto tariff imposed in March 2025 is now compounded by the broader 35% levy on non-USMCA goods, creating an extraordinarily complex compliance landscape for an industry built on integrated North American production lines. Every major manufacturer with plants in Ontario and the U.S. Midwest will be recalculating sourcing and pricing models.

CANADIAN ENERGY AND AGRICULTURE

Alberta's energy exports and the broader agricultural sector face the most direct exposure to the tariff escalation, which is why the separatist movement has gained traction precisely as Carney consolidates power. The rhetoric of western alienation is now tethered to concrete economic anxiety rather than abstract grievance.

U.S. ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE AND TECH

The rout described as an AI wake-up call exposes a sector that had been priced for perfection. With trade policy adding a layer of macro uncertainty, valuations that depended on uninterrupted growth narratives are being stress-tested in real time.

The United States and Canada are not just in a trade dispute — they are in a psychological rupture that is reshaping how Canadians see their closest neighbour and, increasingly, how they see themselves. The Gallup finding that 58% of Canadians no longer trust the U.S. as an ally is not a passing polling blip; it is the statistical expression of a national mood that has shifted from frustration to something closer to estrangement, even as Americans remain largely fond of Canada.
