

An Answer Delivered On Iturup

Vladimir Putin made the first visit by a Russian president to the islands Japan calls the Northern Territories. Tokyo summoned Moscow's ambassador and called it absolutely unacceptable.

Analysts read the trip as the Kremlin's answer to Japan's defence white paper — the same document Seoul and Beijing have already objected to.

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One Paper, Three Neighbours

A Russian president ate caviar on an island Japan says is Japanese, and Tokyo summoned an ambassador. Analysts read it as the third answer to a single Japanese defence document.

Vladimir Putin travelled on Thursday to Iturup, the largest of the four southern islands Japan calls the Northern Territories, in the first such visit by a Russian president. He toured a fish-processing plant, a hospital and a school.

He met the governor of Russia's Sakhalin region and spoke briefly with residents, with state media showing him tasting caviar. The Soviet Union seized the islands in the final days of the Second World War.

Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi said the Northern Territories are an inherent part of Japan's territory both historically and under international law. The visit, she said, offends the sentiments of the Japanese people and is absolutely unacceptable.

Foreign Minister Toshimitsu Motegi summoned Russia's ambassador and lodged a strong protest. Takaichi noted Japan had repeatedly asked Moscow to ensure the president did not go.

The southern Kuril Islands are an integral part of the Russian Federation and became part of it following World War II on legitimate international grounds. The president's travels are sovereign decisions that cannot be subject to discussion with foreign states.

RUSSIAN EMBASSY IN JAPAN, RESPONDING TO TOKYO'S PROTEST · AUGUST 13 2026

Putin had said the day before that Japan's sanctions were unprovoked, arguing Russia is not threatening Japan while Japan has territorial claims against Russia. Ties have worsened since 2022, with Tokyo joining Group of Seven sanctions.

Japan renounced all right, title and claim to the Kuril Islands in the 1951 Treaty of San Francisco but never recognised Soviet sovereignty. A 1956 declaration ended the state of war and no peace treaty has ever been signed.

Analysts at a Washington research institute assess the visit as likely part of the Kremlin's response to Japan's latest defence white paper. That same document drew a protest from Seoul and a statement of disapproval from Beijing.

One publication has now produced objections from all three of Japan's largest neighbours. Tokyo has withdrawn nothing.

The commercial backdrop is unchanged. Beijing has maintained trade measures against Japan since November covering seafood, rare earths and dual-use goods.

Elsewhere India's commerce minister set a one trillion dollar export target, with overseas shipments up 15% in the first four months. China's C919 airliner made its debut on an international commercial route.

Storms continued across the region, with two killed and over 4,000 travellers stranded in Japan's Chiba prefecture, 70 dead in India's Himachal Pradesh, and Filipinos entering monsoon season with thinner savings.

For readers in Latin America the fragmentation is the structural nearshoring case, and two new competitors were named this week. Neither is immediate and both compound quietly.

Three Ways North Asia Could Develop

Three ways North Asian fragmentation could develop through 2028, and what each means for Latin American nearshoring. The chances add up to 100%.

Part 1 · What Has Actually Happened

Japan published a defence white paper. Seoul protested a territorial claim in it, Beijing said it deplored it, and analysts now read Putin's island visit as part of Moscow's response.

Beijing's trade measures against Japan, covering seafood, rare earths and dual-use goods, have been in force since November and none have been lifted. Tokyo has withdrawn nothing either.

This is a large industrial economy in simultaneous dispute with the three states nearest to it. That is a supply chain condition, not only a diplomatic one.

Boards respond to conditions of that kind by placing production elsewhere. Where elsewhere turns out to be is the question that decides the outcome.

Analysts at the Institute for the Study of War said that Putin's visit was likely part of the Kremlin's response to Japan's latest defence white paper.

REPORTED ASSESSMENT · AUGUST 14 2026

Part 2 · Possibility A — Managed Tension (50%)

In this case protests are lodged, statements issued, and trade continues largely as before. Each side has too much at stake to escalate materially.

Relocation continues at its current pace, landing mostly inside ASEAN. For Latin America it means the nearshoring argument stays available but underdelivers.

Part 3 · Possibility B — Broader Restrictions (30%)

Here further trade measures follow the diplomatic ones, from any of the three neighbours. Japanese firms accelerate diversification and pay a premium for speed.

Speed favours distant sites with existing capacity. That is the scenario in which Mexican and Brazilian industrial property benefits most.

Part 4 · Possibility C — A Security Incident (20%)

In this path a naval or air incident occurs around the disputed islands or in the East China Sea. Russia has already restricted navigation around the southern Kurils and run large drills.

Regional risk premia rise sharply and commodity prices with them. It is profitable for regional exporters in the short run and dangerous for everyone in the longer one.

These are just our own opinions, not financial advice. In short: we read North Asian fragmentation as the strongest structural argument for relocating production, while noting most of it currently lands inside ASEAN.

Sanae Takaichi

Prime Minister · Japan

She called the visit absolutely unacceptable and said it offends the sentiments of the Japanese people. Tokyo had repeatedly asked Moscow to ensure it did not happen.

Toshimitsu Motegi

Foreign Minister · Japan

He summoned Russia's ambassador and lodged a strong protest, calling the islands Japan's inherent territory. It is the standard instrument and it has not moved anything for decades.

Japan's defence white paper

Document · Japan

It has now drawn objections from Russia, China and South Korea. One publication producing three separate responses is unusual even for North Asia.

India's commerce ministry

Trade policy · India

It has set a \$1 trillion export target with shipments already up 15% in four months. That competes for the same shelves Latin American manufacturers serve.

China's C919 programme

Industry · China

The domestically built airliner has entered international commercial service after more than a decade of development. It demonstrates that the barrier to entry in commercial aviation is no longer absolute.

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Our take on Saturday is that one Japanese defence document has now produced three separate answers from three neighbours. The most physical of them was a visit.

Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi called it absolutely unacceptable and said it offends Japanese sentiment, while Foreign Minister Toshimitsu Motegi summoned Russia's ambassador. Moscow called the protest unfounded.

Beijing's trade measures against Japan, covering seafood, rare earths and dual-use goods, have run since November without being lifted. Tokyo has withdrawn nothing either.

Storms continued across the region, and more Filipinos are entering monsoon season with thinner savings. That is the third continent this week where a household buffer is described as shrinking.

For readers in Latin America the fragmentation is the structural nearshoring case, even though most relocation currently lands inside ASEAN. Industrial capability of the kind India and China demonstrated this week compounds quietly and then arrives at once.
