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The Firewall Arithmetic

Exit polls gave Germany's AfD 44.5 per cent of Sunday's Saxony-Anhalt election, the largest share any far-right party has won in a German state since 1945, and Chancellor Friedrich Merz spent Monday working to stop the shock from reaching Berlin.

Serbia buried Ratko Mladić in Belgrade as the EU cancelled a ministerial visit in protest and his own party nominated President Aleksandar Vučić to become prime minister; American envoys Steve Witkoff and Jared Kushner called their Kyiv talks with Volodymyr Zelensky "substantive" after a three-hour Kremlin meeting with Vladimir Putin; and a third suspected sabotage fire in three days hit an EU drone plant in Poland, days after arson struck a defence firm in Munich.

This dossier reads a week in which every guardrail bent rather than broke — a firewall tested by arithmetic, a term limit sidestepped by title swap, a war negotiated in adjectives, and an infrastructure campaign nobody in Brussels has yet called by its name.

MAGDEBURG VOTES, BELGRADE BURIES, KYIV TALKS, WARSAW BURNS

The Cordon Cracks

Germany's AfD won 44.5 per cent of Sunday's Saxony-Anhalt election on exit polls, more than double its 2021 result and the largest share any German far-right party has taken at state level since 1945. No mainstream party has offered to govern with it, but none has a workable majority without doing so either.

Chancellor Friedrich Merz spent Monday containing a result his own coalition partners are reading as a national warning rather than a regional one. The AfD's own reading is blunter: a stepping stone toward the 2029 federal election it now expects to contest as favourite in parts of the east.

Serbia buried Ratko Mladić in Belgrade on Monday, his coffin carried by uniformed soldiers under a formula the state insists carried no official honours. The EU's enlargement commissioner cancelled a visit in response, calling the scenes around his death incompatible with the bloc's values.

Hours before the funeral, President Aleksandar Vučić's own party nominated him to become prime minister in a snap election likely set for 18 or 25 October. He would resign the presidency to take the job he last held in 2017, a manoeuvre that dodges Serbia's two-term presidential limit entirely.

Steve Witkoff and Jared Kushner met Vladimir Putin for three hours at the Kremlin on Saturday, their first Moscow visit since January, then flew to Kyiv and called their talks with Volodymyr Zelensky "substantive." Putin ordered a 72-hour pause in airstrikes to cover the trip.

Zelensky told the envoys any deal needs binding security guarantees and showed little interest in the territorial terms Moscow wants Washington to extract on its behalf. Washington is now pushing for a three-way summit that would put Putin and Zelensky in a room together for the first time since the invasion.

A fire gutted the EU's largest drone manufacturer near Skarżysko-Kamienna, Poland, on 31 August, one of three suspected sabotage incidents in three days that also hit a Lublin aerospace plant and German electrical substations. Prime Minister Donald Tusk called it deliberate arson and said Russian involvement was "obvious."

German investigators are separately probing an arson attack and thrown incendiary devices at a Munich defence-technology firm, and allies now describe the pattern as coordinated rather than coincidental. No alliance-wide response has followed; each capital is still treating its own fire as a national case.

A Maltese jury acquitted businessman Yorgen Fenech on 2 September of ordering journalist Daphne Caruana Galizia's 2017 car-bomb murder, and the Attorney General is preparing to appeal. Six co-defendants have already been convicted or pleaded guilty, leaving Fenech's acquittal the case's one unresolved verdict.

Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis unveiled a costed support package worth up to €3.5 billion through 2030 at the Thessaloniki fair, three days after rival Alexis Tsipras priced his own comeback plan at €7.39 billion on the same stage. Protesters filled central Athens streets the same Saturday Mitsotakis's numbers appeared.

A cordon holds until somebody needs it not to; this week, several people needed it not to.

GERMANY'S POSTWAR TABOO

Magdeburg's Verdict

Saxony-Anhalt handed the AfD its largest German state result since 1945, and the coming weeks will show whether the cordon around the far right survives arithmetic that no longer favours it.

Part One · What Actually Happened

Exit polls on Sunday gave the AfD 44.1 to 44.5 per cent of the Saxony-Anhalt vote, against 18.5 per cent for Minister-President Sven Schulze's Christian Democrats, 9.5 per cent for Die Linke and 8 per cent for the SPD. The result more than doubled the AfD's 20.8 per cent from 2021 and made it the largest share any German far-right party has won at state level since the Second World War.

Over 1.7 million people voted, and Infratest Dimap's exit surveys pointed to four decisive factors: declining confidence in established parties, worries over social security, the state of the economy, and migration. Lead candidate Ulrich Siegmund told supporters the party had "made history," calling the result "a signal for the whole of Germany."

No party has indicated willingness to govern with the AfD, which domestic intelligence services classify as right-wing extremist in several states, leaving open the question of whether Saxony-Anhalt gets any functioning government at all in the near term. Reaction abroad split sharply: Donald Trump and Elon Musk posted congratulations, while Poland's Donald Tusk and France's Europe minister voiced concern.

Part Two · Three Ways This Can Go

The first path keeps the AfD out of government through an awkward multi-party arrangement among the CDU, SPD, Left and BSW, with initial counts putting both the BSW and the Greens just over the 5 per cent threshold. It would preserve the national firewall but hand Magdeburg a fragile administration that struggles to pass a budget.

The second path sees informal, issue-by-issue cooperation with the AfD spread from the municipal level, where it already happens in places, up toward the state level, without a formal coalition ever being announced. That would not break the firewall on paper, but it would erode the taboo underneath it in practice.

The third path is paralysis: no workable majority forms, fresh elections are called within the year, and Saxony-Anhalt becomes a live preview of the AfD's national ambitions ahead of the 2029 federal vote. Each path carries different implications for the stability Berlin projects abroad, including to the Latin American governments and exporters who treat German steadiness as a given.

Chancellor Merz's own coalition, already narrow, has little room to absorb a second shock of this size before 2029, which is why Monday's phone calls from the Chancellery mattered as much as Sunday's ballots. Germany has managed the AfD's rise for a decade by treating it as someone else's problem; Saxony-Anhalt has just made that harder to do.

WHO IS DECIDING THIS WEEK

Five People Shaping The News

Five people whose decisions this week set the region's weather.

Friedrich Merz • CHANCELLOR OF GERMANY

Merz spent Monday managing a state election result his party did not win and cannot ignore, working to keep Saxony-Anhalt's shock from cracking his own federal coalition. His choices in the coming weeks will decide whether Germany's far-right firewall is a policy or a memory.

Aleksandar Vučić • PRESIDENT OF SERBIA, PM CANDIDATE

Vučić buried a convicted war criminal with soldiers carrying the coffin and, hours earlier, had his own party nominate him for a job that would let him dodge his term limit entirely. Few politicians in the region choreograph their own survival this openly.

Steve Witkoff • US SPECIAL ENVOY

Witkoff carried Washington's latest peace proposal from Putin's Kremlin to Zelensky's Kyiv in under 48 hours and called the results "substantive" without naming a single concrete outcome. His optimism is now the thinnest thread the process has.

Kyriakos Mitsotakis • PRIME MINISTER OF GREECE

Mitsotakis used a trade fair stage to promise Greek voters a share of a recovery he says took a decade to earn, while protesters filled the streets of the capital the same weekend. His third-term bid now rests on whether that gap closes before an election does.

Marta Kos • EU ENLARGEMENT COMMISSIONER

Kos cancelled a planned Serbia visit over the glorification surrounding Ratko Mladić's funeral, turning a domestic Serbian ceremony into a formal test of Belgrade's EU ambitions. Her words carry more weight than most in Brussels because Serbia's accession file still needs her office's approval.

The day, country by country — two sentences each, no decoration.

UNITED KINGDOM

Commentators say the honeymoon for Britain's new government ended within weeks, sharpening scrutiny on the coming budget.

MPs resumed sitting on 1 September facing an economic agenda inherited rather than chosen by the Burnham government.

FRANCE

The prime minister has dismissed reports of pension and housing-aid cuts as invented, while the Social Security deficit sits near €23 billion.

Officials want the budget adopted before February to avoid a repeat of last year's forced, vote-free passage.

NETHERLANDS

D66, CDA and VVD reached an 11th-hour deal on €6.5 billion in four-year cuts despite lacking a Lower House majority.

The finding lands days before the government must defend its budget in a parliament where it is ten seats short.

HUNGARY

Budapest says €16.4 billion in previously frozen EU funding has been released since the Tisza-led government took office in April.

The opposition Fidesz party says promised family and wage support has not materialised despite the government's structural-reform claims.

The billionaire prime minister, back in office since December, has shown signs of moderating some campaign positions as he governs.

Babiš is expected to address regional security cooperation at upcoming defence-focused gatherings in the coming weeks.

BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA

The Mothers of Srebrenica called the Belgrade gathering a dangerous glorification and urged EU action in response.

Bosnian officials are monitoring whether the EU follows its funeral criticism with any concrete step against Serbia's accession file.

DEFENCE AND SECURITY

Suspected sabotage at Polish and German industrial sites has pushed hybrid-threat planning back to the top of national security agendas. Governments are still responding nationally rather than through a joint alliance mechanism.

ENERGY

Greece's pledge to cut wholesale electricity prices by 30 per cent by 2029 sits alongside German substation attacks that briefly disrupted regional supply. Energy security and energy cost are now the same political conversation across the continent.

DEFENCE MANUFACTURING

The fire at Poland's WB Electronics hit the EU's largest drone maker just as European governments race to scale domestic production. Any prolonged outage complicates supply commitments already stretched by the war in Ukraine.

PUBLIC FINANCE

France, Greece and the Netherlands are all navigating 2027 budgets under tight or absent majorities, a shared vulnerability that could shape how each government survives the winter. Fiscal credibility, not ideology, is this season's dividing line.

WHAT THE DAY ADDS UP TO

The Honest Sentence

Every guardrail this desk tracked on Monday bent instead of breaking: Germany's firewall, Serbia's term limit, Ukraine's ceasefire hopes and Poland's sense of where sabotage stops being deniable. None of that is resolution, and all of it is worth watching closely.

The clearest throughline is arithmetic rather than ideology — coalition maths in Magdeburg, election maths in Belgrade, budget maths in The Hague and Paris, and support-share maths in Athens. Leaders across the continent are managing numbers that no longer move in their favour as easily as they once did.

Latin American readers should note how often this week's European stories turn on the same mechanism their own politics know well: a leader who changes the job rather than leaves it, a budget promise timed to an election rather than a need. The instruments differ; the pattern does not.

Nothing here is settled, and the desk has flagged the figures still in dispute, the reporting we could not independently confirm, and the stories we chose not to run today. Tomorrow's edition will follow whichever of these threads moves first.
